In the first half of the 20th century, farms often sold milk directly to the local population. The following farmers had milk rounds, varying from a few local customers to supplying Uplyme, Lyme Regis and Axminster. In the early days, milk was sold from the can with a measure, delivered on foot, or with horse and milk float.

The advent of the Milk Marketing Board (1933), milk and dairies regulations from the 1940s onwards, and an increasing demand for pasteurised milk, markedly reduced the above numbers by the 1950/60s.
